Compiled Military Service Records of Volunteer Union Soldiers Who Served with the United States Colored Troops: 54th Massachusetts Infantry Regiment (Colored).

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This is probably the most famous of black American regiments in the Civil War. The majority of the enlisted men came from states other than Massachusetts and included two sons of Frederick Douglass. The officers were white. The first recruits were raised on 9 February 1863. The unit was discharged 1 September 1865. There were 270 men lost in the war: five officers and 104 enlisted men were killed in battle or mortally wounded and one officer and 160 men died of disease.

The records are arranged alphabetically by soldier in two series. The first and larger in contained on the rolls 1–19, and the miscellaneous service cards are on the last two rolls.

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This was a Massachusetts volunteer unit in the Civil War, but the majority of men came from other states. Two of Frederick Douglass's sons served in the unit. The records consists of letters, endorsements, orders, descriptive lists, quarterly, monthly, and annual returns, muster rolls, and miscellaneous papers.

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The 55th Massachusetts Infantry (Colored) was mustered into the service at Readville, Massachusetts on 22 June 1863. It was comprised of the overflow from the famous 54th. The unit had recruits from many northern states and one volunteer, Nicholas Said, from the Sudan. They were both free and former slaves. There were 130 men lost to disease and 67 killed. Four blacks became officers in the regiment.

The records are arranged alphabetically by surname. There is a supplementary set of miscellaneous service records on the last roll.

Massachusetts State Census 1855–1865.

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The Commonwealth of Massachusetts took censuses in 1855 and 1865. The records are arranged by county in both years. Within a county the returns are alphabetically by name of town and thereunder in residential order.

In 1855 the names of all members of the household, age, sex, color, occupation, place of birth [state or country], and whether deaf, dumb, blind, insane, idiotic, pauper, or convict are reported.

In 1865 the names of all members of the household, age, sex, color, place of birth, marital status, occupation, and whether deaf, dumb, blind, insane, idiotic, pauper, or convict are reported. In addition the census also indicates if a man was a ratable poll (over the age of 16 and owing sufficient property to be taxed), a legal voter, or a naturalized voter.

Twenty-two towns in 1855 and twenty-six towns in 1865 feature the specific place of nativity rather than just the state or country. In some towns such responses are limited to those born in Massachusetts or in the United States, but in other towns it applies to foreign places as well.

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This manuscript of 37 notebooks is at the Sturgis Library in Barnstable, Massachusetts. These notes on Cape Codders have been arranged in alphabetical order by surname and thereunder by forename. The Register system is used to indicate the ancestry back to the immigrant. Dates of birth, death, and marriage are given for each individual as well as the names of spouses and the issue of each union. More importantly, the sources of the entries are also given so that a researcher can verify the conclusions of the compilers.

Waldo Chamberlain Sprague, *Genealogies of Families of Braintree, Massachusetts, 1640–1850, Including the Modern Towns of Randolph and Holbrook and the City of Quincy.*

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Almost all of the pre–1850 residents of old Braintree are arranged alphabetically on more than 6,000 cards. Sprague utilized the works of many other genealogists who had amassed data on Braintree families. He checked and cited sources as he incorporated the data into his own compilation. In the introductory comments he noted various group migrations from Braintree to Rehoboth about 1643, Block Island in 1660 and later, Mendon in 1663, Easton about 1704, Lebanon and Windham, Connecticut about 1713, Norton about 1726, Holliston about 1745–1750, Williamsburg in 1771, Oxford and Lyme, New Hampshire, about 1780, Thetford and Fairlee, Vermont, about 1780, and Braintree and Randolph, Vermont about 1790. No Braintree family, however, settled in New Braintree, Massachusetts. On the reverse of many cards appear abstracts of pertinent pre–1792 Suffolk County wills and deeds, but very few entries of this nature appear for post–1792 Norfolk County records. It should be noted that the reverse side of the cards were microfilmed together following the appendix on out-of-town families (largely of residents of adjacent Milton). The order of the cards is from right to left horizontally.

Charles E. Banks *Genealogical Collection.*

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The collection is composed of fifty-four volumes resembling scrap books containing typewritten and handwritten notes regarding the early Pilgrim and Puritan families of Massachusetts. There are abstracts of wills, baptismal and marriage records, and family charts. The index volume is in three parts: surnames, stray names, and places.

The Bowman Files.

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George Ernest Bowman, the founder of the Society of Mayflower Descendants, compiled 20,000 pages in his goal to identify all of the descendants of Mayflower passengers. He included abstracts of wills, deeds, Bible and family records, and many of the records he amassed are unique to his files. While some of his research has been superseded by later research, his manuscript genealogy remains the largest collection pertaining to Mayflower descendants. *Bowman Files Instructions*, R929.3744/B787, provides guidance in using the collection.

Susan E. Roser has abstracted various categories of these records. 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This index consists of individual cards containing the name, age, sex, date of arrival, steamship, occupation, birthplace, country of citizenship, last residence, intended U.S. state of residence, and mental and bodily condition. Moreover, the index also indicates if the individual had been in the U.S. before. The names of persons apparently constituting a family group are usually on the front of the index card, but on some cards the names are on the reverse. Because the index also contains a separate card for each person, the reverse was not filmed. Some cards later found to be out of order were filmed at the end of the appropriate roll.

In addition there is an invoice book from 5 July 1725 to 21 April 1737; a letterbook from 13 June 1737 to 25 April 1739; and a ledger book from April 1725 to March 1732.

Clarence Almon Torrey, New England Marriages Prior to 1700.

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Torrey's work lists every married seventeenth-century New Englander whom he could find any record in any printed work and a few manuscripts at the New England Historic Genealogical Society to 1960. The alphabetical listing of 37,000 marriages probably accounts for 99 percent of the married population of New England leaving issue. About 70 percent of the wives are identified by their maiden names. Torrey based his identifications on what he felt were the best printed sources for the husband and the wife. He frequently suggested resolutions of conflicting data and inserted question marks for unproved assertions. A typical entry provides the name of the husband, the identity of his wife, the date of their marriage or the birth year of their first child, their places of residences, and when known the birth and death years of each spouse.

Following each couple Torrey listed every printed source in which he had found data pertaining to either partner. There are more than 100,000 references to volume and page with five to ten references per entry. These provide access to more than 2,000 printed works for further genealogical research. Torrey included those New Englanders who migrated to Long Island, New Jersey, and elsewhere in the seventeenth century. Occasionally he listed an entry from the *Boston Evening Transcript*, but he made no systematic survey of this source.

Because Torrey offered no access via the name of the wife, the published version of his manuscript, *New England Marriages Prior to 1700*, R939.343/ T694N/1985 greatly enhances this research tool. The published version, however, does not identify any of the sources. Melinde Lutz Sanborn's *Supplement to Torrey's New England Marriages Prior to 1700*, R929.373/ T694N/1985/Supplement/1992 and *Second Supplement to Torrey's New England Marriages Prior to 1700*, R929.373/T694N/Supplement/1991 continues the project with later and additional published sources.

1. *Boston Evening Transcript Genealogical Columns*.

The *American Genealogical Biographical Index*, R929.1/A512I, indexes the names in the columns from 1906–1941. It does not index those from 1891–1905. Each query was assigned a sequential number, and responses were printed under the same number.

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This is the largest regional compilation of New England source material compiled by private scholars. For more than a quarter of a century they copied thousands of vital records, cemetery inscriptions, church and Bible records and compiled town genealogies for 57 towns in Hampshire, Hamden, Franklin, and Berkshire Counties, Massachusetts as well as 30 other towns in the state. In addition they also included 6 Connecticut towns [Gilead, Norwalk, Stafford, West Stafford, and Willington], 2 Iowa settlements [Farley], South Kingston, Rhode Island; Gopsport, New Hampshire; and Cleveland, Ohio. There are compiled genealogies for pre-1850 residents of Belchertown, Northampton, Pittsfield, Southampton, and Wales done in the nineteenth century, and the Corbins added to them extensively.

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This is a series to encompass the vital statistics of all of the Massachusetts towns for the colonial period into the nineteenth century. There is variety from town to town in the scope of the records selected. In addition to the record books of vital statistics, one may also encounter cemetery and church records when the former are incomplete or no longer survive. When there are printed abstracts of the records or if one obtains certified copies, the original records often contain more information. They are also more likely to be arranged by family.
