On 4 June 1870 a law known as *ley Moret* granted freedom to certain categories of slaves including those over the age of 60, those belonging to the state, and children of slaves born after 17 September 1868. The law also resulted in the preparation of the central register of slaves. Ledgers exists for geographical departments 1, 2, 4, 5, and 6. An entry gives the name of the slave, country of origin, residence, name of parents, sex, marital status, trade, age, physical description, and master's name. The text is in Spanish.

The records consist of requests by foreigners to the Spanish authorities for permission to reside in Puerto Rico. There are lists of foreigners residing on the island and occasionally copies of final naturalization papers. Immigrants received free land and were exempt from taxes for five years after which they could become Spanish subjects or return to their homelands. A typical application provides the name of the immigrant, the names of the members of his immediate family, the country and town of his origin, proof of being of good moral character and a Roman Catholic, amount of capital being brought into the country, town he intended to inhabit, and trade or profession. The files are alphabetically arranged, and the text is in Spanish.
