Correspondence, Field Notes, and the Census Roll of All Members or Descendants of Members Who Were on the Roll of the Ottawa and the Chippewa Tribes of Michigan in 1870, and Living on March 4, 1907 (Durant Roll).

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This work has the 1908 census roll of the Chippewa and Ottawa tribes of Michigan made by Horace B. Durant with his field notes and his correspondence. His field notes provide the genealogical information used to determine if an individual was eligible to be included on the census.

The records exist because \$131,188.94 including interest had been awarded to the tribes based upon an 1836 treaty plus an additional \$9,786.69 from the treaty of 1855 which had been erroneously held by the Treasury. Durant determined that 7,396 persons were entitled to payment. The Commissioner of Indian Affairs disallowed 1,952 names on the roll so 5,444 persons shared the \$131,188.94. The remaining amount derived from the 1855 treaty necessitated a supplemental roll of children born between 1 March 1907 and 1 August 1908. Of the 236 names submitted, 202 were approved.

The Durant roll is arranged alphabetically the initial letter of the surname and grouped thereunder by the tribal bands of Sault Ste. Marie, Mackinac, Traverse, and Grand Traverse. In other words, under the letter "A" would appear all of individuals with a surname beginning with that letter arranged the Sault Ste. Marie band, the Mackinac band, the Traverse band, and the Grand Traverse band. The 1870 roll number, the Durant roll number, Indian name, English name, relationship to head of household, age, sex, tribal band, residence, and remarks.

From the 1870 roll, the numbers 747, 1331, 2437, 3956, 4462, 4684, 6151, 6275, 6496, 6525, 7028, 7035, and 7168 were disallowed. Durant "present" roll numbers annotated with check marks were also disallowed.

Durant's field notes are his family group sheets with genealogical data, but they do not exist for all of the families listed.

This is the alphabetical card index to the compiled service records of volunteer soldiers who served in Captain Isaac S. Rowland's Independent Company, Brady Guards, Michigan Militia. Each card has the name and rank of the soldier. Captain Rowland's Company was mustered into the service of the United States on 5 January 1838 to guard against robbery of the Detroit arsenal and magazine. Upon the arrival of the Regular Army on 4 February, the troops were discharged. The company again saw service from 22 February to 31 May 1839.
