Sir Richard Griffith carried out the survey of Ireland to determine the amount of tax each tenant should pay towards the upkeep of the poor and destitute within his Poor Law Union. Accordingly, it lists owners and tenants alike on a county by county basis, giving their location of townland, parish, barony, &c. and valuation of the holdings.

The Tithe Composition Acts of 1823 and preceding years provided that the payment of tithes to the clergy in each parish would be paid in money rather than in kind. There were consequent valuation surveys from 1823 to 1837 in all parishes except those in cities and towns. The records of each parish contain a list of land tenants, all of whom were liable for payment of tithes to the Established Church [the Church of Ireland] regardless of their religion. The tithe applotment books list the tenant's name, townland, parish, land holding &c., and the yearly tithe for which he was liable.

The applotment books provide a census of the land owners and a listing of their tenants for the parishes in Northern Ireland.

The indexes have been filmed at a high reduction [42x] and require the use of a high magnification reader. There is an index to townlands and another index to names of individuals.

The Royal Irish Constabulary Index.

The index is divided into two periods of time, 1816–1882 and 1882–1921. The Irish Peace Preservation Force was raised in 1814 by act of parliament. They were known by the nickname of Peelers for the Chief Secretary of Ireland, Sir Robert Peel, who with three castle magistrates had drafted a plan for raising a constabulary force for Ireland. The temporary measure became permanent in 1822, and the force became known as the Constabulary Police. During the rebellion in 1867 Queen Victoria honored the force with the title The Royal Irish Constabulary. The force went on to become the premier constabulary force in the British Empire. Members were drawn from Ireland, Scotland, Wales, and England. The force was disbanded in 1922 when the Irish Free State was created.

There are 44,000 entries in the first part and 40,000 in the second. Most of the men in the former were from Ireland, but that was not the case for the latter. The index gives the name of the individual, age, native county/country, whether married, year of enlistment, comments, and the LDS film number. The number after the oblique stroke refers to the page.

In the comment column may appear an “E” or “EM” which indicates the constable planned to emigrate. Sometimes a death date is in this column. The LDS film numbers begin with roll 0856066. The first three digits have not been used. With the exception of roll 0856063 there are two or three volumes of records per roll so 6063/56C is a citation to page 56 of the third volume on roll 0856063. The index also includes the names of those who applied but were rejected.
